

Aborn Opera in Brooklyn

The Aborn Opera Company will give its last eight performances in the coming week at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, and will then move to the Bronx Opera House for a season of three weeks, beginning Monday, May 7. Their final week in Brooklyn will be equally divided between Verdi's "Rigoletto" and Donizetti's "Lucia di Lammermoor," the former occupying Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, with the regular Wednesday matinee, and the latter scheduled for the last three nights and Saturday matinee. Three artists new to the Aborn forces will make their first appearance with the organization—Nadina Legat, a Russian coloratura soprano; Victor Ballister, a Spanish barytone, both of whom came to America for the first time last autumn to sing with the Boston Opera Company, and Francesc Milana, the young American lyric soprano, who made her New York debut last winter with the Cosmopolitan Opera Company, before which she sang in France and Spain. The Misae Legat and Milana will appear at alternate performances in prima donna roles, Mr. Ballister will divide the barytone interpretations with Richard Bunn, and others in the casts will be Giuseppe Agostini and Andrea Arensen, tenors; Francis Tyler, basso; Luigi Dallemolle, barytone; Lloyd Gilbert, tenor, and Estelle Mount, mezzo-soprano. Max Fichandler will conduct and Charles H. Jones will direct the stage for all performances.

Ragtime in the British Army

One of the foremost English critics who has joined the colors and is awaiting the call to the trenches has written a letter to a friend in New York, and the friend has permitted us to read it. One paragraph is interesting especially in the light thrown on it by the friend's comment (he is also an Englishman). The most admirable and serious minded critic writes: "I have had a good many new experiences since joining the army, but the only one which touches on our common interest is that, for the first time, I have had to make a close acquaintance with 'ragtime.' It is extraordinary, and to my mind lamentable, what an influence ragtime exercises in the British army. Not that it is altogether contemptible, but its half cynical sentiment is quite foreign to the British character, and it can't last here. I hope it won't, anyway." Comments his friend: "I agree with what — says about ragtime, but I can't overcome a certain sense of mischievous amusement in the situation. The committees of the 'unco guild' keep on issuing solemn instructions to the troops as to what they ought to enjoy singing, while the troops themselves keep right on singing ragtime."
