WOMAN WALKS OUT OF JAIL AND FAINTS

MRS, LILLIAN B. PETERS OVER-COME BY EMOTION

She Is Accused of Having Secured Fifteen Dollars from Music Pupil Under False Pretenses

Mrs. Lillian B. Peters, also known as Mrs. Victor E. Arensen, who is charged in a complaint sworn to by Miss Margaret Orth of 519 East Sixteenth street with having defrauded her out of \$15 for music and singing lessons, which, it is asserted, were

never given, fainted in the corridor of the central police station shortly after being released under \$100 bonds yes-

terday afternoon. Mrs. Peters was arrested several days ago. Soon after being taken into custody she furnished the necessary bond and was released. When she was

arraigned in police court Saturday one of the bondsmen asked that he be re-leased from obligation and that his name be marked off the bond. This

was done and she was sent back to jail. Since that time her young husband, Dr. Arensen, has been trying to obtain bondsmen. Yesterday Mrs. Peters appeared in

court and pleaded not guilty to the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses and asked for a trial by jury, Mrs. Peters was sent back to her cell in the matron's department of the city jail and her husband began a search for bondsmen. After several hours he returned with Attorney Grove Walters and P. S. McNutt of Glen-dale, who signed the papers that gave

the woman her freedom. When she walked out of jail she rushed into the arms of her husband, became hysterical and fainted. She was taken into the office of the police captain, where she soon regained consciousness and later left clinging to the arms of her husband, who is

twenty years her junior.
